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
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




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Doncaster Pub of the Season - Doncaster Brewery Tap (City Centre)

On a wall above the bar of the Doncaster Brewery and Tap there's an impressive display of certificates, both local and regional. It's three deep and a testament to the work of Ian and Alison Blaylock over the past 13 years. Soon they'll have to find room for two more as the DBT has been awarded Yorkshire Cider Pub of the Year - and it's also our Doncaster Pub of the Season for Autumn 2025.

Sandhouse Blonde, Cheswold Bitter and Saint Legar are just three examples. Then there's the DBT's speciality - six hand-pulled ciders as well as a range of CAMRA-approved bottled ciders. There are few pubs in Yorkshire which can match DBT in that field.

DBT is more than just a pub though. It has also



Since the Doncaster Brewery opened at an industrial unit near Wheatley Hall Road in 2012, Ian and Alison have made an impact on the local real ale scene. Their ales quickly gained fans among local drinkers. When they moved into their current premises (see photo above) on Young Street in 2014 the DBT became a go-to for real ale drinkers. The quality of their ales is shown in the sheer number of awards they've won and, naturally, it's part of the Donny Dozen real ale trail.

Up to six cask ales are always available, often with names reflecting local history and culture - made its own contribution to local culture, hosting live music (Doncaster Roots Music sometimes use the upstairs room as a venue), poetry sessions and a Shakespeare readers group who recently completed reading the entire works of the Bard. There's live music most Saturday afternoons, often provided by a local ukulele group.

Ian and Alison will be presented with their welldeserved awards on Saturday 1st November at 8pm. This is sure to be a popular event so don't be late. All are welcome to come along and support the occasion.

District Pub of the Season - The Hilltop (Conisbrough)

John and Julie Bullcroft celebrated 20 years of ownership of The Hilltop in May of this year. This is an impressive achievement, especially at this time when so many traditional pubs are closing. Claire Duke and Graham Baxendale the bar staff always give a friendly welcome and Brad Duke (Creative director and Chef) now does a lot of the cellar work to keep the beer in good condition and is usually found in the kitchen, where he and Julie make excellent pies.

There are two large bars, one of which is mainly for meals, plus a comfortable covered outdoor area, where you can see the swallows and wagtails circling round. There is a fine selection of old photos in one of the bars as the pub originated about 200 years ago. A secret garden at the back is in the process of being developed.



There are usually 4 hand-pulled beers available, 2 from White Rose brewery and Little Critters and 2 changing beers plus 1 hand-pulled cider. There is also a selection of keg beers and ciders.

Opening times are Mondays 4pm to 10pm, Thursdays 12 to 10pm. Friday and Saturdays 9.30am to 10 pm and Sunday 9.am to 9 pm

Meals are served as per What Pub details. Monday night is chip butty night and where else can you get a chip butty with Canadian steak or fish fingers and mushy peas to have a meal for two for about £12. The pies on Thursday are well known, sizzling Saturday includes meals such as Cajun chicken and traditional Sunday lunch is always very popular. It is recommended to book in advance for Saturday and Sunday. The weekend mornings are now providing welcome breakfasts. The kitchen has recently joined Just Eat deliveries which are also proving popular.



On Saturday 21st June their beer festival proved a great success with an additional outdoor bar having 6 extra hand-pulled beers and two live music acts from local artists. They hope to have a sausage and cider festival later in the year so keep an eye on their Facebook page for details.

The Hilltop is situated on the main A630 between Doncaster and Rotherham with car parking space and close to an X3 bus stop for the bus from Doncaster to Rotherham and Sheffield.

I am delighted The Hilltop has won Pub of the Season again and trust there will be a good turn out by Camra members for the presentation on Saturday 27th September at 4pm.

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

Once our ancient ancestors discovered that by settling and cultivating grains they would have a regular and plentiful food source, it was only a matter of time before beer became a part of everyday life. And that beer was mainly made by women. For centuries, women brewers remained key participants in our beer trade, up to the Industrial Revolution when increased mechanisation, alongside Victorian societal constraints, conspired to push a lot of them out. From then on, commercial brewing was generally considered a male-led profession.

But things are changing. With the increase in new breweries, and a growing enthusiasm for beer, women are back at the helm at an evergrowing number of British brewers, large and small, reasserting their dominance in the industry.

This important book, meticulously researched by beer historian Dr Christina Wade, charts the rise and fall – and rise – of women in Britain's brewing trade, and includes interviews with women working in today's beer industries. It tells us the whole story, explaining the real reasons why women brewers became marginalised, while also debunking some tired old myths along the way.

It was fitting, therefore, that the anniversary event was held at the Hallcross and included a mini-beer festival as a tribute to the branch's early years. I would like to thank our host Julian Clark for arranging everything and to Kate and Karl Hadfield for the tombola. Thanks should also go to Natalie Hodgson who ran a charity cake stall in aid of Macmillan Cancer Support, which I thought was a nice touch. Everything was home-made and the Bakewell Tarts were delicious! There was a box of beer for the winner of 'The Worst Quiz in Doncaster' and live music (unplugged) later on. Everyone seemed to have a good time (that means no-one has complained vet LoL!) and the 'drop-in. drop out to suit your day' concept also seemed to work.

Thank you to everyone who attended. If you missed it, you missed a 'rait gud do'!

The Donny Dozen Real Ale Trail social went ahead as planned, despite the rain. The pubs and outlets on the trail were reviewed by CAMRA members to check their current status. Advertised on the same principle as mentioned above, the Draughtsman on Doncaster station was the first

port of call but from there on we did the trail in the reverse order. The bad weather early on did put some off at first but, as the day progressed, people began to meet up with us. Although all twelve bars and pubs featured in the publicity leaflets were visited, sensible drinking was encouraged throughout the day with thirds and halves being ordered by many. A most enjoyable time was had checking out the quality and variety of the real ales on offer and we were able to demonstrate that the trail can successfully be dipped in and out of, to suit those taking part.

'The Trolleybus Museum at Sandtoft' is staging an open day on Sunday 19th October. Not normally something I would say too much about in this



publication, but I have been asked to mention that CAMRA members have once again been invited to use the free vintage bus services connected with the event as a means to access the (almost) bus route-free Isle of Axholme. This part of our branch is difficult to get to without using a car which is a shame as the Isle contains some cracking pubs, including the current holder of the District Pub of the Season award. Don Valley Brewery Tap is also located close to the museum and we hope to be able to arrange a visit.

This has got to be the ideal time to explore the area so why not try something different and give it a go? An enjoyable afternoon can be spent hopping from pub to pub. All the buses are absolutely free and, as there is no obligation to visit the museum, up to four hours can be spent on the

Pub & Brewery News

Editors Note: We take every effort to make sure that everything is correct when this article goes to the printers. However, with the current volatile situation with pubs, clubs and breweries throughout the country the time between writing, printing and distributing may result in the situation changing. If your visit to a pub is important then check before you travel to make sure the situation has not changed.

South Yorkshire

The Doncaster Free Press has reported that Sam Smiths are looking for two couples to run the **Ridge Wood** in Edenthorpe and the **Holly Bush** in Kirk Sandall. Both of these pubs have been closed for several months. There is a requirement for the couples to be locals.

In Bessacarr on a recent visit a member found no real ale at the **Toby Carvery**. It appears the last real ale was sold in May and no more is likely to be available. The other local pub, the **Flying Childers** was selling Marstons Pedigree.

At Hooton Pagnell we are pleased to report the **1903 (The Hostel)** has reopened. The new team of Dean and Julie began on the 4th June. It is understood that there is a cask ale available

Two members visited the **Travellers Rest** at Tickhill and found that the kitchens were now serving meals.

On a visit to Mexborough a member found Abbeydale Pale and a Citra at **Pastures Lodge**. Stancil Black was available at the **Old Market Hall.**

The **Horse and Groom** in Armthorpe continues to sell Black Sheep Bitter and the other pump usually has a rotating guest pale ale. Following refurbishment of the lounge, they have replaced some of the outdoor furniture in the beer garden. There have been restricted days of meal availability but they have now returned to a 7 day service with the addition of lunchtime choices for those customers who want smaller portions. This menu is available Monday to Friday between 12 and 3pm,

The **Old George** at Sykehouse has continued with its Summer Wheels Café and Old George events for bikers. They are held every Wednesday from 5.30pm to 8pm. Even if you are not into motor bikes, it's quite a spectacle. Don't expect them to be drinking real ale as non-alcoholic drinks are the order of the day.



The **Wheatley Club** closed several months ago and, whilst it was not an establishment serving real ale, we must note that the premises have been sold to a local man and the Doncaster Free Press has reported that he intends to call a meeting for the local community to have their say about its future. It's enlightening to know that there are still people about who take into consideration the views of a community.

City Centre

The Railway is under new management. There was no real ale available on a visit but watch this space for possible developments.

All seems very quiet at the former **Corner Pin** building. We are still no closer to finding out what the future has in store.

Due to poor sales, the **Hallcross** has decided to stop selling Stocks St Leger Gold. This is one of the three beers resurrected from the brewery that was on the Hallcross site many years ago. It's unfortunate but the other two Stocks beers, Old Horizontal and Select. will continue to be sold.

When Russ, the landlord at the **Draughtsman**, was creating his pub on platform 3b at Doncaster Station he envisioned providing a much-needed service to travellers passing through the station.

Little did he know that several years later he would be serving a drink to one of the world's greatest travellers. The Doncaster Free Press reported that travel journalist and broadcaster Simon Calder had popped into the pub. He described it as "an amber lining amid the storm clouds of travel".

Doncaster Brewery and Tap have a range of 6 real ales on their bar, four of which are brewed on site and two of which are generally guest beers. On the cider bar are 6 ciders. A dry, a medium, a sweet, a Perry and two CAMRA-approved fruit ciders

East Riding of Yorkshire

The **Tom Pudding** at Goole continues to feature four rotating real ales and a real cider. Keep an eye on their Facebook site for music events that are held here

North Yorkshire

Peter, the landlord at the **Bay Horse** in Great Heck, will be celebrating one year at the pub on August 15th. He has done a good job at supporting the local community and during the year there has been a number of different events. You can expect to find beers from Old Mill Brewery here and some good food.

Isle of Axholme

The **Carpenter's Arms** at Westwoodside has been under new management since May. On a visit there were two cask ales. One was a blonde ale and one amber/dark ale. The third pump will be used for

milds and stouts. Most ales are sourced locally. The 399 Isle of Axholme bus stops outside the pub.

The campsite at **Willow Fields** in Haxey now has a public licence to sell alcohol. You may find examples of Pig Barn beers here.

Brewery News

At the **Doncaster Brewery** Ian has recently had a planned operation on his shoulder. Prior to the operation Ian brewed numerous times to replenish shock. He brewed a pale, a blonde, a Kentucky Common and a Black IPA, filling the cellar with casks. Unsurprisingly, the Handsome Pat sold quickly and Robin was called upon to do an assisted brew day to replenish stocks. The Sand House Blonde will also have to be brewed again soon before Ian is able to use his shoulder for anything more than lifting a pint of beer. If you would like to see Doncaster Brewery beer on the bar in your local, please mention it to the landlord and Doncaster Brewery will be happy to deliver.

50 Years of Branch Awards

It's always nice when you can give something back to a person, organisation or business. From the start CAMRA branches created Pub of the Season Awards. Over the years this has expanded to Pub of the Year, Club of the Year and Cider Pub of the Year. There are also very specific awards the branches have created. Added to this is the prestigious CAMRA Good Beer Guide entries.

Good Beer Guide

For a member to be eligible to vote for a pub they must have drunk at least half a pint in that pub in the last 6 months. When the voting is complete then the pubs will be assessed, where possible, for their beer scores in the National Beer Scoring System (NBSS) and the licensee and/or cellar manager will be assessed to see if they have been in post for 6 months.

Pubs of the Season

The branch holds quarterly awards for pub of the season at Doncaster and District levels. The Doncaster award is for all pubs within 6 miles of the Mansion House in the city centre. All other pubs are eligible for the district award.

The process starts by pubs being nominated at

relevant branch meetings and those pubs can then be voted for by members within a defined time period. The winners are the pubs with the most votes. The social secretary will then arrange presentations at the pubs.

Good Beer Guide Voting and Pubs/Clubs/ Cider Pubs of the Year

This voting process starts in September of each year and members will receive guidance on which pubs are eligible and how to vote. The last date for voting is midnight on the day of the AGM in November.

Garth Nicholls Award

The award is for recognition for all the work an individual has done supporting real ales in the branch area. Nominations can be made at a branch meeting and then voted on at that meeting.

Regional and National Awards

The local year winners are then considered for the various regional and national year awards. For instance the Doncaster Brewery Tap, which has regularly won our Cider Pub of the Year award, has now twice won the Yorkshire Cider Pub of the Year Award.

Doncaster CAMRA's 50th anniversary party at the Hallcross

Doncaster CAMRA was created in 1975 which gave us an excuse for a party this year. The Hallcross was the venue for this event. It included a mini beer festival, with a beer brewed in our honour called L (50 in Roman numerals), an Lderflower pale ale (not our pun!). Some of the

early members of our club joined in the festivities. There was a fiendishly difficult pub quiz based on history, not easy after a couple of pints, a raffle, and coffee and cake sale in aid of Macmillan charity. To complete the evening, live music was put on and we all had a good time.











What was the state of the drinks industry in the 70's

We have written a lot, over the years, in Donny Drinker about the creation of CAMRA and our branch but there is a limit by using words of how far you can express the importance of the CAMRA movement.

Recently we came across a video on YouTube of an episode of the Philpott Files which used to appear on the BBC in the seventies. It gives a brief review of the production of alcoholic drinks over the past 300 years and then features the changes to brewing the various forms of beer in the 50s, 60s and 70s

There was a time when the owners of breweries could grow very rich and they were known as the 'beerage'. The tax revenues from alcoholic drinks

were huge and there is a suggestion that it just about paid for the NHS. Then in the 50s television began to impact on pub attendances and the consolidation of breweries began to take shape with 7 brewers, known as the '7 Sisters', controlling much of the market at the expense of independent brewers.

The video then moves on to follow the role the emerging CAMRA organisation played in ensuring drinkers still had a choice of purchasing real ale in their local pubs. At the time of the video Philpott comments that CAMRA was regarded as the most effective consumer group in Europe.

If you want to look back in time, search for 'Philpott Files, beer review' on YouTube.

State of the Pub Industry

The pub trade could do with some good news but a number of sources are saying the outlook is poor.

The British Beer and Pub Association reports that 378 pubs in England, Scotland and Wales are in danger of closing this year and there is a desperate need to cut pub costs. It quoted that £1 in every £4 spent on beer goes directly to the Treasury.

David Wigham, the commercial director of Admiral Taverns is quoted as saying that energy costs were still double the level before the energy crisis.

The Morning Advertiser has carried out a survey of beer prices across the UK. In London the average cost of a pint is £6.10 while the cheapest average pint is in the Midlands.

The Doncaster CAMRA branch is not surprised by these figures. We fully understand the pressures

our local pubs are under and have every sympathy with our hard-working licensees and their staff. Let's not forget that there is also an impact on our brewers.

There is only so much the branch can do to help although we know that CAMRA nationally is fighting to support everyone in the pub trade and constantly raising important issues with our politicians. The loss of trade equates with a loss of revenue to the government which will affect their spending plans. Locally, we ask the general public to support their local pubs and clubs as much as they can. They are much needed community assets that will be missed when they are gone.

The Hallcross won our Pub of the Year award for 2024.



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
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Yorkshire CAMRA Cider Pub of the Year






Pub Ghosts

There have also been occasions when a ghostly child has been seen to run around the chairs of diners. Chefs have reported the presence of a tall man standing in the doorway of the kitchen.



Eagle & Child - Auckley

There has been an inn on this site since 1492. There are at least two reported ghosts. One is a scruffy man who sits at his favourite table having a smoke. The smell of his smoke has been reported to linger in the air.

There is also the ghost of a labourer who once worked on a redevelopment of the pub. He had been banned by the landlord for wearing dirty work clothes and died the next day. Legend has it that he returns because he had a liking for one of the cleaning girls



Red Lion - City Centre

This busy city centre Wetherspoons pub is another "ghost pub".

In this case the ghost has a name and is called Rosie. She is reported to be responsible for glasses jumping off the bar and doors mysteriously slamming. She is believed to have hung herself in the area which is currently the gents toilet. The reason for her committing suicide is thought to be because she was jilted at the altar. Witnesses have also reported a male ghost has also been seen.



The Punch Bowl - Thorne

This was once a large private home. The ghost this time is a small ghostly boy. Overnight guests have said they felt like they were being pushed down into their beds and staff have reported the feeling of being watched in the cellar.



No-one knows how much truth there is in these tales so don't hold back on visiting these pubs. Ghost experts have visited the Red Lion in the city centre and all claim there is a paranormal presence.

An almost full bus, only two spare spaces, left West Street promptly at 2.13 pm. Unfortunately, one of our number had been delayed because he was engrossed in a film titled 'Mr. Beamish Goes South' and was late for his connecting bus. Even though he had clearly been engrossed ,he strongly recommended anyone who is thinking of seeking out the above film not to bother.

We headed off in the general direction of Sheffield. Although not officially a mystery trip, the vast majority of people declined the offer of seeing the itinerary thus creating the illusion of a little excitement. One can only assume that the ones that looked are the sort of people who peek at the end of a book when they are only halfway through.

We travelled down the motorway (M18) and off at junction 31 of the M1, heading to **Killamarsh** and a micropub named Guzzle. This is sister to another pub, also called Guzzle, in Woodseats. As it was a full bus it took some time for the nice lady to serve us all but we had plenty of time. They had Acorn Old Moor Porter and two Nailmaker beers. I had a pleasant pint of the porter.

Back on the bus and further into North Derbyshire where we visited the small village of **Middle Handley** and the Devonshire Arms. From the outside there was no escaping the fact that this looked like a posh pub. As every real ale fan knows, posh usually equates to bland beer and inflated prices. We were all pleasantly surprised to find that two of the three hand pumps were dispensing beers from the Little Critters Brewery at a not excessive £4.50. One member enquired about the Theakstons XB on the third pump and was told it was £6 a pint.

It's not my place to comment on such matters but the member in question opted for the Little Critters beer

The next stop was the Travellers Rest just outside the village of **Apperknowle**. This had a good selection of what can only be described as real ale 'standards', Timothy Taylor Landlord and Landlord Dark, Bradfield Farmers Blonde amongst others. I opted for the Landlord Dark, or Ram Tam as us stubborn old folk insist on calling it. This pub features an amazing selection of cheeses that would very much excite the taste buds of the Wallaces of this world.

It is very nicely located on the top of the hill and features an area outside, across the road, where you can sit and enjoy the view of somewhere that definitely isn't Chesterfield but features a lot of north-east Derbyshire.

From the seats it was possible to hear the distinctive sound of leather on willow. It begged the question, how did someone manage to create a flat cricket pitch on the side of a hill. A closer inspection revealed that they hadn't. I have honestly never seen a cricket ground with a steeper slope. In fact, apart from in the Winter Olympics, I don't think I've ever seen any sports pitch with a slope that steep. Any batter on that ground was most definitely going to be aiming for one boundary more than the other.

And so to the Cross Daggers at **Coal Aston**. The bus couldn't make it up the street because of some awkwardly-parked cars which meant a quick walk, or sprint, up to the pub. As well as a number of national brands, it featured a beer from the local

Drone Valley Community Brewery which was particularly nice.

The pub has recently been awarded the local CAMRA Pub of the Year award. As we all know, this is the most prestigious award any pub can win. A small TV in the corner was showing the Andorra v England World Cup qualifier game and, for some reason, I was the only person watching it. Fortunately, we had to leave for the next pub at half time.

We now turned and started heading back towards home and into **Mosborough** and a micropub called Craftworks. This was actually quite posh with some very nice handpumps built into the stone bar. This very popular pub boasted a number of options including a house beer from Abbeydale and handpulled draught bass. We scouted round for seats and managed to bag a few until the people who had booked them for the evening turned up.

The last stop on the day's tour was another pub In Mosborough called the British Oak. This was quite busy because it had a function on in a marquee at the back. A large roadside pub with lots of seating and a good food offering, it looks like a standard chain pub but is operated by True North Brewing.

On the bar, amongst others, was their resurrected Stones Best Bitter. Having ordered a pint I was looking forward to being able to complain that it 'tasted nothing like it used to' and 'wasn't particularly nice'. I was, however, disappointed and all agreed it was a particularly agreeable pint of best bitter.

Despite the event there was plenty of space in the pub and we basically took over the conservatory area to enjoy our final pint. It always surprises me how quickly these days fly by. It seemed no time at all since our first pint in the Guzzle and now it was time to board the bus for the return trip to Doncaster

The Bailey Head in Oswestry, Shropshire has been named the Campaign for Real Ale's (CAMRA) overall Pub of the Year for the first time. The pub is a rags-to-riches success story after the owners turned what was once a closed local into a haven for the local community.

The Bailey Head had been failing under the ownership of a major pub company and was listed by CAMRA as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) to protect it from redevelopment. Nine years ago, it was bought by Duncan Borrowman and Grace Goodlad who poured their knowledge and passion into it to transform the fortunes of the pub.

Community and inclusion are at the heart of the pub, and it acts as a hub for locals to come together for good causes through events like their charity pub quizzes and live music. Aside from providing a welcoming atmosphere, the Bailey Head also boasts an impressive array of cask beer and cider.
